Convention in Washington, D.C., the name of Landscape Design Do consider scheduling a series of Study Program was changed to "Landscape Design Schools" to coordinate with the titles of Gardening Study Schools and Environmental Studies Schools. The Operations Guide will be updated but all the material NGC LANDSCAPE contained therein is still correct. Several other recommendations **REPORTS** were approved of which LDS Chairmen should be aware.

- Landscape Design School Courses held back-to-back are required to have a two (2) day minimum for each course.
- 2. All requirements as stated in the LD Handbook/ Operations Guide must be maintained; i.e., number of subjects and time allotment for each subject-ten (10) hours per course-exclusive of the examination time allotment.
- 3. Unless these requirements are met, the LD School Chairman has the final authority to grant or not approval grant accreditation for a state school course or refresher.
- 4. Disqualification of LD Schools/Refreshers held Photos: Victoria Bergesen without prior NGC accreditation
- 5. The establishment of a sixweek timeline for LD School chairmen to submit

rosters following the conclusion of a course, refresher or multiple refreshers. (This ruling applies to state-sponsored, regional-sponsored and NGC-sponsored courses/ events.)



STATE NEWS

MARYLAND

The Federated Garden Clubs of Maryland, Inc. Landscape Design Council held its April meeting and garden tour at Historic London Town, a 23-acre park and historic site on the South River near Annapolis. The site is the location the largest ongoing of archaeological exploration in Maryland and the National Historic Landmark William Brown House, circa 1760. Historical gardening techniques and heirloom plants are featured in the kitchen garden, African American garden, medicinal garden and seasonal ornamental gardens.

In June, the Council visited Ladew Gardens in Monkton, Maryland. The 22 acres of gardens include 100 larger-than-life topiary forms and 15 theme gardens. A few are the pink garden, Victorian garden, berry garden, formal rose garden, orchard garden, yellow garden, teahouse garden, waterlily garden and iris garden. There is also a manor house, circa 1747, on the property. At September's meeting, we will present gardens of some of our own consultants.

Our Council has launched a concentrated campaign encouraging clubs to submit their landscape and/or Habitat for Humanity projects for Landscape Design Council cash awards for 1st, 2nd, 3rd and HM awards. We are hoping for winners in each of our Districts.

On August 4-5, twenty-three people attended the GCO Ohio Council of Landscape Consultants Refresher taught by Dennis Karem, a Hilliard, Ohio Landscape Architect with Environmental Management, Inc. and popular Landscape Design School Instructor.

Concentrating on hands-on drawing and designing our own gardens, Dennis took us through quick Power Point overviews throughout the two days with pictures to remind us landscape design principles. We each completed actual drawings of our own home landscapes after reviewing each step of the process, ending with upgrades, changes and plant selection. At certain steps, Dennis would give us 15-minute exercises to quickly sketch 3 different ideas for things like the walkway to the front door, placement of specified plants, etc. to help us gain confidence in our knowledge and open up the creative side of our thinking.
